Background

Consultant interviews were conducted on June 29th, 2022. The interview team consisted of Stephen Julian, Austin Miller, Barbara Washburn (SRCD), Chris Hunley (Sacramento County), Pat Kirby (GID), and Rick Ferreria (Amador). Each consultant was evaluated using a standardized scoring questionnaire. The scores were compiled and are as follows, from highest to lowest score: EKI; GEI; Cali Ag. These results were presented at the July 7th, 2022, PMA Committee meeting. The PMA Committee discussed the candidates and reached a consensus on providing a recommendation to the CGA Board. The PMA Committee recommends that the EKI team be selected for project scoping. Staff then prepared a draft scope of work in coordination with EKI to present to the CGA Board.

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DRAFT SCOPE OF WORK

Work efforts will be charged on a time and materials basis, in close coordination with CGA representatives.

Task 1 – Participate in July Projects and Management Actions (PMA) Committee meeting to prepare preliminary Priority PMA List

The EKI Team will review CGA's most up-to-date Project Priority List, focusing on *Phase 1 Activities led by CGA* (i.e., PMA #5 Land Repurposing, PMA #7 Conservation, and PMA #8 Small Scale Recharge Projects). An EKI Team representative will attend the PMA Committee meeting to develop preliminary project list and receive relevant supporting information from the PMA committee.

Task 2 – Prepare for and attend August PMA Committee meeting to finalize Priority PMA List and ranking by benefit and cost.

The EKI Team (EKI, LWA and Land IQ) will develop descriptions for each Phase 1 PMA Activities led by CGA. The descriptions will include the relevant data gaps to resolve as part of project implementation. Implementation costs will be developed for each project, including data gap filling efforts. The results will be shared with the PMA committee during their August meeting.

Task 3 – Attend September Public Meeting to discuss recommended PMA's and costs.

The EKI Team will participate remotely to support the PMA committee during the September Public Meeting.

Task 4 – Update and finalize PMA Priority List for submission to CGA (October/November).

Incorporate essential technical information as needed into project descriptions to reflect public input and support PMA committee preparation of the final Project Priority List for presentation to the CGA.

Task 5 – Support Grant Writer.

The EKI Team will provide technical and cost information support to the Grant writer preparing the Grant application.

Task 6 – Project Management.

Routine project management tasks including budget management and invoicing.

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PROJECT SCHEDULE

EKI is prepared to start work on the above Scope of Work immediately upon authorization to proceed. It is anticipated that the work effort will extend through November 2022. We will inform the CGA of any issues that arise that may affect the schedule for completion or impact the anticipated level of effort.

COMPENSATION FOR CONSULTING SERVICES

Inasmuch as the exact level of effort required to complete the above Scope of Work cannot be known precisely, EKI proposes to perform the work on a time and materials expense reimbursement basis in. A breakdown of the estimated budget is provided in **Table 1** below.

On March 28, 2022 Governor Newsom_issued <u>Drought Executive Order N-7-22</u> that included new well permitting requirements for local agencies to prepare for and lessen the effects of drought conditions (Action 9). The California Department of Water Resources released a "<u>Drought Well Permitting Requirements</u>" factsheet.

A representative from the County of Sacramento Environmental Management Department (well permitting agency for Sacramento County) will share details on Sacramento County's <u>new procedures</u> to comply with Executive Order N-7-22 and an accompanying <u>Compliance Bulletin</u>.

Water Infrastructure Funding in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law

Strategic Growth Council: Regional Climate Collaboratives Program

The California Strategic Growth Council (SGC) invites Pre-Proposals for Round 1 of the Regional Climate Collaboratives Program. Pre-applications are due July 15, 2022. This new capacity building grant program funds community-rooted and cross-sectoral partners to develop the processes, plans, and projects that will drive and sustain climate action in their communities. In this first round, SGC has \$8.35 million available for grant awards, and applicants have flexibility in requesting their funding amount within the range of \$500,000 - \$1,750,000. ICARP Grant Programs

- The ICARP Adaptation Planning Grant Program will invest \$25 million over multiple funding rounds for local, regional, and tribal governments to support climate adaptation and resilience planning activities.
- The ICARP Regional Resilience Planning and Implementation Grant Program will invest \$250 million over multiple funding rounds to scale regional climate resilience solutions.
- The ICARP Extreme Heat and Community Resilience Grant Program will support local and regional heat adaptation by investing \$100 million in extreme heat and urban heat island mitigation activities.

Webpage for CA Water Plan Update 2023 Published by DWR

DWR has unveiled the new webpage for <u>California Water Plan Update 2023</u>. The California Water Plan is updated every five years. It is the State's strategic plan for managing and developing California's water resources. Update 2023 will emphasize climate change adaptation, regional and watershed resilience, and water equity. **The third Policy Advisory Committee meeting will be held July 21**st from 10 am – 1 pm with a focus on equity in water management (registration link here). DWR and the State Water Resources Control Board have released <u>principles and strategies for groundwater management</u> <u>and drinking water wells</u>. The document provides a framework for the development of drought-resistant communities. Approximately 82 percent of Californians rely on groundwater for some portion of their drinking water or other household uses. A <u>Spanish version</u> of the draft is available.

California's Groundwater Live: Up-to-date data on groundwater conditions, well installations and subsidence

The Department of Water Resources (DWR) released the final <u>California's Groundwater – Update 2020</u> (<u>Bulletin-118</u>), containing information on the condition of the State's groundwater, DWR has also developed a companion web-based application called <u>California's Groundwater Live</u> (CalGW Live), leveraging the <u>California Natural Resources Agency Open Data Platform</u> (Open Data) to improve the access and timeliness of statewide groundwater information. The easy-to-use interface will make many of the data sets used in CalGW Update 2020 available in an interactive map format that will be updated regularly for viewing and downloading. OpenET makes tracking water use data easier with satellite data

A space-based tool is ready to help track water in the western U.S. Using data from satellites, <u>Open Evapotranspiration</u> (OpenET) gives farmers and other water users information on how much of their water loss ends up as evapotranspiration. The OpenET data are available for 17 western states, including the Colorado River basin area. NEW: Groundwater Sustainability Plan Reporting System – Upcoming 'Incomplete' Resubmittals

The SGMA Portal's Groundwater Sustainability Plan (GSP) Reporting System has been updated to accept the responses to the Incomplete determinations of GSPs released back in January 2022. The revised GSPs must be submitted to the SGMA Portal by July 20 and July 27, 2022 (deadlines were identified in each determination). Multi-GSP basins deemed Incomplete must also resubmit a Coordination Agreement for the basin. A basin's determination, and associated information, can be located of the SGMA Portal's GSP Status Summary Page.

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NEW: Dry Well Susceptibility Map

The DWR, in coordination with the State Water Resources Control Board, has developed an interactive mapping tool, called the Dry Well Susceptibility Tool. This tool identifies areas within groundwater basins that may be prone to water supply shortages in drinking water wells. State and local agencies and well owners can use this tool to anticipate where wells may go dry based on historical conditions to inform drought preparedness decision-making. To use this tool, navigate to California's Groundwater Live website and click the Dry Domestic Well Susceptibility tab. A fact sheet on this tool, as well as DWR's Dry Well Reporting System, is available here.

Dry Well Reporting Site

There is a website available to <u>report private wells going dry</u>. Information reported to this site is intended to inform state and local agencies on drought impacts on household water supplies. The data reported on this site (excluding personal identifiable information) can be viewed on the <u>SGMA data viewer</u> or downloaded on the <u>CNRA Atlas</u>. Individuals or local agencies can report water shortages and <u>a list of resources are included on the webpage</u>. The reporting forms are available in both English and Spanish. <u>Local agencies can now sign up to receive notifications of any dry wells reported in their area</u>. DWR Releases GSP Assessments for COD basins that submitted by January 2020

DWR has now released the assessment for all COD basins that submitted GSP's in January of 2020. The release of incomplete determination begins a 180 day timeline to correct identified deficiencies that that precluded approval. These assessments and notification letters, along with other pertinent information, can be viewed

DWR is developing eight Proposition 68-funded technical projects

These projects include airborne electromagnetic surveys, improving groundwater elevation and quality monitoring networks, Statewide land use data collection, improved subsidence monitoring network, installing and maintaining stream gauges, maintaining and enhancing statewide well completion reports, managing and reporting sustainable groundwater information, and enhancing and maintaining DWR's modeling tools. - AEM webpage contains information on the how the process works, safety, schedule, data submission by GSAs, TAC, pilot study data and more. Public webinar was held June 8th 12:00 1:00, a recording can be viewed here and handouts can be downloaded here. Sonoma Valley Basins were surveyed in November, 2021 and North San Joaquin and Southern Sacramento surveys completed in April 2022. The raw resistivity data has been published to CNRA Open Data portal and the full interpreted data should be available in early 2023.
- 2018 Statewide Crop Mapping data dataset builds on the 2014 and 2016 statewide crop mapping datasets DWR previously released and includes multi-cropping information. The 2018 dataset includes agricultural land use and urban boundaries for all 58 counties in California. Water year 2019 is planned to be released in July of 2022.
- InSAR subsidence data is now available through January of 2022 and can be viewed on the SGMA data viewer. The updated GIS services and data reports are also available online. Future data will be released on a quarterly basis.
